Grand Trunk High School, Evansburg

September has been off to flying start for the staff and students of Grand Trunk High School. We are pleased to report that our enrollment numbers are up about ten students from our spring projections. During these first few weeks, staff has met with their advisory groups reviewing that the focus of the groups is to give students an opportunity to complete any missed assignments, write any guizzes or exams, and stay current with all of their academic responsibilities. The advisory group time is also to help develop positive relationships amongst the students across all grades with a staff member in the building. Students are also enjoying a couple of new option choices at both the senior high and junior high level. Agriculture (aquaponics), forensic science, and sociology are new senior high options while at the junior high level, students have choices such as introductory music, communications technology, management and marketing to name a few.

Volleyball season has started at both the junior and senior high level. The senior girls travelled to Vermilion for a tournament the first weekend back. The girls played in ten matches from Friday night until Saturday night, and came home with a bronze medal in the B division, which is the team's best finish since attending this tournament. The senior boys' team went to Rocky Mountain House the following weekend and played extemely well and managed to come home with a fourth place finish. The junior high girls have started their league schedule and have a couple of tournaments planned for their season.

As we teach our students to be sensitive to the difficulties of those who have come before us, we will cover our school in orange shirts creatively designed by our the members of our community.

October continues to be an action-packed month starting with a Métis-based cultural program led by Ian Porteous meant to build community within our school. The classes will have a workshop with Mr. Porteous and then come together at the end of the day for a final celebration through storytelling and dance. Our storytelling events do not stop there. The Evansburg Public Library has invited Kathy Jessup to come to our school for a presentation, as well.

As students walk, drive or ride the bus to our school, they have witnessed a different kind of story unfolding before their eyes. Evansburg has the privilege of receiving an Emergency Response Building that houses not just the firefighters but also the EMTs and Peace Officers. Fire Chief, Les Schatz, invited the Evansview students to be the first official visitors to the building as we celebrate Fire Prevention Week.

Evansview School has become home to many programs above and beyond our kindergarten to Grade 6 programs. Wildwood School welcomes a new principal this year, Mr. Mike Gray. Former principal, Mr. Daniel Seitz, has retired and we thank him for his many years of dedicated service. Mike Gray, an educator with a special education background, has been a classroom teacher and administrator for a combined thirty years. Mr. Gray has expressed his intent to be constantly visible in the school and states, "My door is always open!"

Many of the school's physical spaces have been transformed! Drop by the school if you are curious to see the changes. Extra effort went into making each classroom

ready for an exciting year of learning. For example, the look of what was formerly known as the library has completely changed. Where schools were once known to have a central library in their building, individual classrooms now house their own books, often numbering in the hundreds, and the books are tailored to the reading levels of the students of that grade. Today, the giant amount of square footage with a carpeted floor formerly known as the library has become a performing arts based room. In fact students are currently undergoing the process of holding a vote to officially rename the room to match it's new purpose. A big thank-you goes out to everyone who pitched in to help move huge amounts of excess furniture.

Mrs. Shannon Kolotyluk, new to junior high, has spearheaded the creation of The Maker Lab, a shared space with an emphasis on implementing science and technology. The new Maker Lab exists where the old computer lab was. Stand alone computers have been replaced by portable laptops that students can use anywhere so the expansive counters that used to hold computer workstations are now clear and perfect for doing science, construction or art projects. Fine Arts programming, especially music and singing, has increased in the higher grades. Outdoor education as a junior high option is back at Wildwood School. Teachers have also expanded field trip opportunities for their students with three trips happening by mid month: Pembina Valley Hiking Day, History of Metis Day at Tipple Museum and a Camp WARWA trip.

After two months of summer holidays, our Superflex team came back strong and ready to take action. Mr. Meier and the Grade 6 class, worked hard in the first two weeks making fabulous Superflex/Unthinkables costumes in order to put on some performances for our younger students. To kick off our assembly, they reviewed the Unthinkables that our students worked to defeat last year. Then we moved on to our current Unthinkable "Space Invader." 
