The longer winter did not slow down the staff and students at Niton Central! Students spent lots of time in April preparing for our school talent show, 'Niton's Got Talent'! Students from both elementary and junior high participated in this awesome community event, put on by our great school council. We also had a visit from Evergreen Theater who put on a great show about our changing ocean climate. The Grade 6 class started new units in science and social studies. They review food webs and food chains by dissecting owl pellets, before beginning their 'Trees and Forests' unit. The Grade 6 students also experienced the world of 'Black Panther' when their classroom was transformed into Wakanda. Students had to analyze the 'Black Panther' comic book, compare the Wakanda tribes and government to the Iroquois Confederacy, and used their knowledge of angles and shapes to create hologram projectors. Students loved getting an in-depth look into the amazing fictional country of Wakanda!

Ms. Sterling's Grade 2/3 class began their unit on 'Rocks and Minerals' in April. They began their unit by discussing geodes, and what they are. They continued to discuss what geologists are and then became geologists themselves. Students use hammers, and were able to used their geologist skills to break apart rocks to find the geodes. We have some great scientific minds in 2/3! Our humanities teacher, Ms. Paul, took two junior high students to the UNESCO Conference for Diversity and Human Right. Niton Central is a part of the United Nations Associated School network, which means that the United Nations recognizes Niton's commitment to the humanistic, ethical, cultural and international dimensions of education. This year is the 60th anniversary for the Declaration of Human Rights, and UNESCO invited Ms. Paul and two junior high students to join other UNESCO schools in Winnipeg, at the Museum of Human Rights.
