The Apology by Pope Francis, April 1, 2022

Resilient - The Aseniwuche Winewak Story

- "In 1910 the local Indigenous people of the Jasper Valley were pushed out of their homes and some of the families relocated to the northwest corner of Alberta Canada to an area that is now known as Grande Cache. They lived as expert guides and trackers while under constant watch living a traditional lifestyle until the late 60s when the coal mine was established and the town was built. Resilient is the story of the Aseniwuche Winewak nation who have struggled to maintain their identity, culture and land in a world that constantly changes the rules. All while refusing to officially acknowledge them as being Indigenous."
