National Truth and Reconciliation Week 2022 - Remembering The Children

- Truth and Reconciliation Week 2022 is a national program for all schools across Canada. This
 year, our theme is "Remembering the Children." Participate and memorialize the children lost to
 the residential school system and honour Survivors and their families. Learning and
 commemorating the truth of our history from First Nations, Métis, and Inuit knowledge keepers is
 an important part of the path to Reconciliation.
- This year includes an expanded program with age-appropriate material for students grades 1 through 12.
- Days 1 to 3 feature pre-recorded videos and a live Q&A session. On September 30, students can view a live televised broadcast for Orange Shirt Day from their homes.
- Day 4 features an in-person gathering that will stream live for those unable to attend.
- All sessions will be held virtually on Hubilo. Registration is required to stream live and prerecorded sessions and to participate in the Q&A segment:
