



UNLEARNING COLONIALISM



DR. DWAYNE DONALD
University of Alberta
Canadian Research Chair

Dwayne Donald is a descendant of the amiskwaciwiyiniwak (Beaver Hills people) and the pâpâsces nehiyawak and works as a professor in the Faculty of Education at the University of Alberta and is also a Canada Research Chair in Reimagining Teacher Education With Indigenous Wisdom Traditions. Dr. Donald is working to facilitate this transformational shift. He and his research team are attending to the experiences of educators and conceptualizing a teaching model for unlearning colonialism. They are also creating research hubs that will unite diverse groups and identify innovative, research-informed teaching practices that reimagine teacher education with Indigenous wisdom traditions.

Dr. Donald will lead a discussion about colonialism as an ideological and structural predominance embedded within schooling culture and share insights on what it might take to unlearn colonialism.

Indigenous Pathways Lead Teachers will share personal and professional insights gleaned from participating in professional development sessions with Dr. Donald in the year-long GYPSD program on decolonizing education.

CREE PRINCIPLES: OUR WAY OF LIFE

Johanne Johnson is a settler Canadian who is a consultant to organizations seeking meaningful engagement with Indigenous Nations. She has also provided human resources services to community-based Indigenous organizations, including Aseniwuche Winewak Nation. Johanne is a chartered human resource professional and recently completed a Master's degree in Native Studies at the University of Alberta. Her thesis explored how employment-related issues within an Indigenous organization may be resolved using principles sourced from Cree legal tradition. This inquiry was informed by knowledge gathered from interviews completed with Aseniwuche Winewak Elders and knowledge keepers on their Nation's foundational principles. Outside of work, Johanne serves on the Board of Governors of Bent Arrow Traditional Healing Society, an organization in Edmonton that serves the needs of Indigenous children and their families.


Carol Wanyandie is a member of the Aseniwuche Winewak Nation and is the great-great-granddaughter of Ewan Moberly, whose homestead, just outside of the town of Jasper, is now a Parks Canada historic site. As one of her Nation's knowledge keepers, Carol has offered Cree translation and coordination services to academic researchers for over a decade. She is also a teacher and facilitator of land-based courses offered by the University of Alberta on AWN traditional territory. Carol is the proud mother of 10 children, most of whom are attending public school in Susa Creek and Grande Cache. She has served as a Parent Council Board member of the Northlands School Division. She strongly advocates increasing the number of hours of Cree language instruction to ensure that their Nation's primary language is kept alive and thriving with the younger generations.

NEHIYAWEWIN CLASS WITH ELDER VICKY WANYANDIE

Vicky Wanyandie has been providing Cree language instruction to elementary school students of the Northlands School Division for the past 30 years. Vicky is a lifelong learner and is in the process of completing a teaching certification at the University of Alberta.

Vicky and her siblings were raised on her parents' trapline on the Aseniwuche Winewak Nation's (AWN) traditional territory, and she spoke Cree exclusively until she entered kindergarten. As a member of AWN's Elders Council, Vicky is committed to contributing to her community's well-being and transmitting her deep knowledge of the Nation's culture, particularly the Cree language, to other community members. Vicky is a devoted mother and auntie, with three of her children currently enrolled in local public high schools.
